

ith lakes, parks, golf courses, and a vast nature preserve in proximity to the state capital and Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Lacey finds a balance between outdoor attractions and the amenities of a city with a young and active workforce, not to mention the student body at St. Martin's University and South Puget Sound Community College.

Originally called Woodland, after the Wood family who settled here in 1853, Lacey became a logging center and a pioneer of beer. The founding family started the first brewery in what became Washington state, which reportedly served an expensive gourmet cream lager. Staying true to its past, today Lacey's burgeoning Producer's District has locally created beer and wine on tap. Pair that with an exciting food scene, namely, the growing Depot District, a designated food truck space that has proven popular with Lacey's

locals. If you're up for an epicurean adventure, hop in the car—or on a bike—and set off on the Thurston Bountiful Byway, a 60-mile journey of eats and sips around Thurston County.

But before you hit up Lacey's food and drink scene, work up an appetite exploring Lacey's great outdoors!

Things To Do

1 Lacey Depot District

Lacey's Depot District, a product of the Lacey 50th Anniversary Landmark Project, comprises a replica of the original train station that put Lacey (then called Woodland) on the map. The Depot District is the beginning of a larger site that will contain an expanded Lacey Museum and Cultural Center, and, city leaders hope, musical and entertainment events. Choose from a variety of food trucks, a train-themed play structure, and trail amenities. The Depot is open May—September for use of indoor picnic tables and for private rentals. 5555 Pacific Avenue SE, Depot Park – Lacey Parks, Culture & Recreation

2 Lacey Museum

Located in the heart of Lacey's historic neighborhood, experience Lacey's surprising and fascinating past in the charming 1928 Russell House, once a residence, fire station, and Lacey's first City Hall. 829 Lacey Street SE

3 Karen Fraser Woodland Trail

This former Georgia Pacific Rail line is now a paved bike and walking path that parallels Pacific Avenue. Park and start at the Woodland Creek Community Park in Lacey and follow the trail for 2.2 miles to where it connects with the Chehalis-Western Trail, providing a 22-mile, multi-use experience.

4 Producer's District

Lacey, like its spirited neighboring cities, is quickly becoming a a craft beverage destination. Take in a flight of wine at Stottle Winery, then hop on over to Top Rung, a brewery started by two former firefighters, for a stein of Lacey Lager. For another kind of craft, swing by Shipwreck Beads, the world's largest bead store, for endless options of jewelry-making supplies.

5 Billy Frank Jr. Nisqually National Wildlife Refuge

Bring binoculars and arrive at dawn for primetime bird watching, or simply enjoy a peaceful walk any

time of day along the boardwalk at this US Fish and Wildlife Service-owned preserve just outside Lacey on the Nisqually River Delta. The estuary, named in honor of the late Nisqually Tribal leader, is home to over 200 types of birds as well as otters, beavers, salmon, and a myriad of other creatures. fws.gov/refuge/billy_frank_ir_nisqually

6 Lakes

Lacey is home to five lakes: Long, Pattison, Hicks, Chambers, and Lake Lois, making the city a historic hotspot for vacationers. The fish are jumping at each lake, but for swimming and watersports, head to Long Lake Park on Long Lake, where kids (and adults) can swim and frolic in the grass. Explore the trails around Hicks Lake and Lake Lois, paddle out in a canoe on Pattison Lake, or drop a line in Chambers Lake in hopes of catching perch, bass, and catfish.

7 The Golf Club at Hawks Prairie

Two courses, The Links and The Woodlands, provide unique 18-hole golf experiences. For a classic Northwest feel, putt among the pines and marshes at The Woodlands. The Links, by contrast, offers a Scottish style course with views of Mount Rainier and Puget Sound. 8 Parks

Burn off energy at the Lacey Regional Athletic Complex, one of the largest sports complexes in Washington. Soccer and baseball fields, basketball courts, wide open spaces, and playgrounds, make this a popular spot for families and sports enthusiasts. Rainier Vista Park has a large play structure, sports courts, and a skatepark made for all-ages fun. For athletic fields, trails, and grassy knolls for picnicking, visit the small but mighty Wonderwood Park. Woodland Creek Community Park provides play structures, picnic shelters, and fishing at Longs Pond. Coming soon, a new 540+acre park - Greg Cuoio Park with 18 holes of disc golf, all-access playground, and trails.
